Farly Loma Linda faculty did more than ust write for The ed, es they supported it financially In one issue published in 1919 there is a note that "Ider . . tarr has donated \$100 to The es to be

applied to a publication fund. This fund will give us a sub stantial financial backing and will be drawn on in making the paper bigger and better as conditions permit. Filder tarr believes These ed es has a mission and he believes it strongly enough to put \$100 into it.

The ed, es con tinued publication from 190 until 1962 almost uninter rupted with the e ception of a few months during orld ar I. Throughout the years for mats have changed as did edi tors. The last issue of The es appeared during the last month of the first year when our institution was renamed Loma Linda niversity. It carried the story of the 50th commencement of the institution and the first commencement service to be held as a university. In 1962 the magazine was succeeded ers e which is now known

on campus as . . . e.
